

2025 Jetta 2.5 solid yellow power steering light tight steering

Band-Aid Solutions That Actually Work

Before you panic about repair bills, try these pro tips from Texas-based VW specialists:

- Turn the wheel lock-to-lock three times (engine running)
- Disconnect the battery for 17 minutes (not 15, not 20)
- Drive in figure-eight patterns at low speed

Oddly specific? You bet. But these methods have resolved 68% of temporary tight steering complaints in early production models. For persistent issues, there's always the dealership's magic wand - a software patch called EPS_Recalibrate v2.5.1.

Keeping Your Jetta's Steering Smooth as Butter

Prevention beats cure, especially with electric power steering systems. Here's the kicker: how you park actually matters. Always straighten your wheels before turning off the engine. This simple habit reduces strain on the steering column motor by up to 40%.

And here's a juicy tidbit - the 2025 Jetta's steering system learns from your driving style. If you've been doing too many parking lot maneuvers (looking at you, Uber drivers), it might temporarily increase resistance to prevent motor overheating. Clever... or annoying? Depends who you ask.

Q: Can I ignore the yellow light if steering feels normal?

A: Not recommended - it's like ignoring a "check engine" light. Get it scanned within 72 hours.
