



How Much to Get Solar Power Installed

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What Determines Solar Power Installation Costs?

Myth 2: "Batteries double the cost." Actually, battery prices fell 89% since 2010. A Tesla Powerwall now costs \$11,500 installed - still pricey, but not prohibitive for blackout-prone areas.

Myth 3: "Maintenance eats savings." Rain cleans most panels automatically. The only real cost? Maybe \$150 every 5 years for professional inspection.
