But here's the kicker: It doubles as a phone charger. Imagine ending your set by powering the crowd's Instagram uploads. Talk about fan service!

Why Europe's Street Musicians Swear By It

Amsterdam's canal performers face unique challenges - limited outlets, rainy weather, and picky tourists. Local artist Lena Vox told us: "Since switching to the Solo XT, I've doubled my tips. No more begging caf? owners for outlets!"
